Curriculum Roadmap

(K-2nd Grade)

OVERALL GOAL OF THIS PROGRAM

To create a safe and engaging environment where children will learn about the dangers of abuse and the difference between safe and unsafe touch. The terms "sexual abuse" are not used in the K-2 program.

A personal story of a boy's experience with abuse and how he kept it an UNSAFE secret. The discussion of how unsafe secrets are not healthy to keep. To empower children to have a voice in who they are, the confidence to speak up, and the awareness to recognize a potential dangerous situation.

BE SEEN AND HEARD (K-2ND GRADE) COVERS:

- What is a **Safe touch**? (Ex. Handshake, fist bump, cotton, the ground, high five)
- What is an unsafe touch? (Ex. Being pushed, hit, tripped, edge of a knife)


- How do safe touches make you feel? (Ex. Feel good, loved, happy)
- How do unsafe touches make you feel? (Ex. Feel bad, sad, mad)

THE BODY SAFETY PLAN (THE 4 RULES)

- 1. If anyone tries to touch you in a way that makes you feel strange or uncomfortable, say, NO! GO TELL someone you know.
- 2. If someone tells you that their touches are a secret, say, NO! GO TELL someone you know. Your VOICE is a powerful tool. Don't be afraid to use it.
- 3. Don't let the person tell you that you are a bad child if you don't touch them or look at their private body parts. Say, NO! GO TELL someone you know.
- 4. If someone has touched your private body parts tell someone you trust. Keep telling them until they believe you.

Follow Up Questions

- 1. What is another example of an unsafe touch?
- 2. What is another example of a safe touch?
- 3. Expand on the concept of, "Private".
- 4. Make sure the students understand the concept that, "No one should touch their private body parts unless it is to keep them clean and healthy." Who are other people that should never touch your private body parts?
- 5. Expand on the "Trusted Hero" lesson. Go around the room and ask each student to identify this important person.
