### A brief description of roofing choices

Roofing is one of the most important investments you can make. Improper, aged or substandard roofing can lead to a host of other more expensive problems. If you are selling your property, a well-chosen roof can yield up to 75 percent of a return on your investment.

The question is, what roofing to pick? There are so many options on the market. This e-book is designed to inform you on a variety of roofing types for both commercial and residential buildings. We will be reviewing natural, asphalt, composite, metal and commercial roofing options. Armed with basic knowledge of what is available, you will be ready to narrow your search for the perfect roof.

### **Natural Roofing Products**

The most beautiful, long lasting, and costly roofing options on the market are naturally derived. Most other roofing options work toward imitating the following natural options:

#### Wood shingles

Wood shingles can be comprised of many kinds of wood. However, hard woods such as redwood or cedar tend to have longer lifetimes. A quality hardwood roof can last up to 50 years. Many of the municipalities in the Dallas, Fort Worth area have outlawed the use of wood shingles due to fire hazard. Even if you currently have wood shingles installed on your roof, check with your city government offices to see if you will be able to proceed with a new installation.

#### • Slate Shingles

If you are considering an American made product, slate is an excellent option. It is quarried in the Northeastern United States and easily lasts up to 50 years. It has become popular for its earthy, yet refined, appearance. Slate is the most expensive roofing option on the market, however the value it can add to your home, its durability, and longevity make it cost efficient in the long run.

#### • Tile

Tile shingles are an exotic ode to Spanish architecture. They are generally comprised of whatever natural materials are in the immediate area. Thus, you can find slate, clay or any such variety of tiles on the market. With the exception of copper, tile is the most durable natural roofing option available, having a lifespan of up to 80 years.

#### • Rubber Roofing

Rubber roofing can be quite beautiful. It is the least expensive of natural roofing options, and it is environmentally friendly. Rubber roofing is made from recycled tires, slate dust, and saw dust. With a lifespan of 75 years or longer, it rivals tile in longevity. Generally, rubber roofing comes with a 30-year guarantee, meaning it should need no shingle replacement for that timeframe. It is also common for rubber roofing to carry a lifetime warranty.

### Low Cost, High Quality Faux Roofing Options

Cost, durability and functionality can play a major role in your roofing choice. While the look of high-end natural roofing styles are nice, you need to be prepared for initial cost and upkeep. However, if you wish to have the look without the fuss you might consider one of the following options:

#### • Asphalt Roofing

Asphalt roofing shingles are a widely used and trusted option. They are fairly inexpensive and have a clean uniform appearance. Asphalt roofing is composed entirely of glass fiber mats that are saturated with asphalt and covered in granuals. They tend to be lightweight and relatively durable.

#### • Architectural or Laminated Roofing

Architectural roofing is an asphalt type roofing ideal for homeowners, and commercial property owners, who would like one of the highest quality faux roofing options available. In the roofing world, they are where function meets style. Startling three-dimensional designs place architectural roofing in the realm of functional art.

Practical manufacturing processes have birthed varieties that resist mold and algae growth, insulate and deflect light. Be it the look of wood, tile or slate, architectural roofing has a host of varieties that can meet your needs at a practical cost. It is worth noting, architectural roofing shingles and traditional asphalt share many qualities in common. Perhaps the largest variance is that traditional asphalt shingles lack the extreme visual impact of their high tech counterpart.

#### • Composite Roofing

Composite roofing is comprised from recycled rubber, plastic or a combination of the two. Composites are far more durable than asphalt based shingles. Warranties on composites can reach up to 50 years.

Composite roofing is stunning and cost efficient. Once installed, it is also virtually indistinguishable from the real thing. There is a huge market for composites, as such, the options range from LEED recognized brands, to 'class A' fire resistant composites with a 'class 4' impact resistance rating.

#### • Metal Roofing

Metal roofing is a broad term that covers the styles and materials one can choose from when outfitting your roof with metal. We have come a long way with metal roofing design; there are various styles of metal roofing now available:

- Vertical Panels or Standing Seam
- Metal Shake
- Metal Tile
- Metal Shingle/Slate

Metal roofing can be found in a relatively diverse number of metals. There are older options, well known from childhood stories, like tin and newer options such as aluminum and lead. However the two most commonly used on commercial and residential properties are copper and steel.

### Copper Roofing

Copper roofing is one of the oldest and most beautiful roofing options available. While the initial cost is considerable, the lifetime cost of copper roofing makes it far less expensive than almost every other roofing option. Copper roofs are literally known to last centuries with proper care. It is highly resistant to the elements and never needs to be painted or finished. Copper roofing also improves with age, the shiny warm color of new copper weathers out into a rich bronze as time passes. Copper is a relatively easy material to work with, so if your property has unique roofing angles, domes, turrets or gables do not shy away. Beauty, practicality, durability and traditional luxury, embodied, are copper roofing.

#### Steel

Steel roofing options can be broken down into 3 main categories:

- 1) Corrugated galvanized steel is little more than raw wrought iron steel coated with zinc. It is generally used in corrugated sheets and is one of the most common metal roofing types available.
- 2) Stainless steel is often chosen for its aesthetics. However, it serves a more functional purpose since it is well suited for harsher climates. It is most commonly available in seam profiles, but shingles are another, more decorative, option.
- 3) Stone coated steel was originally designed in World War II for use in reconstructing damaged buildings and increasing their safety.

It has a beautiful ceramic appearance and is created by using an emulsion coating of zinc and aluminum bound stone granuals coated with an acrylic gel overlay. The coating is virtually impossible to remove and is extremely durable.

Metal roofs are making a major comeback because they are considered environmentally friendly. Most metal roofing carries a 'class A' fire rating and 'class 4' impact rating. Another bonus is they have an extremely long lifespan and, depending on the metal, require little upkeep. The choice of a metal roof for your home or business is an excellent investment. It can differentiate your property from the pack.

### **Commercial and Heavy Duty Roofing**

Sometimes jobs call for a no frills, no nonsense approach. The following roofing options are relatively easy to install, are durable, and economical. While some are used mainly in commercial roofing, their use can be translated into a variety of other roofing projects:

### • Corrugated Roofing

Corrugated roofing is a highly diverse and economical choice for a variety of projects. Commercial establishments, such as warehouses, storage facilities, garages, and other structures, such as sheds, that need durable roofing at nominal cost are all prime corrugated roofing candidates. A lesser-known, but highly useful, way to use corrugated roofing is as a skylight; since one of the options available is a clear plastic, it makes an effective and inexpensive alternative to glass. Corrugated roofing is available in both metal and plastic and can come in a variety of painted colors. It ranges from opaque to translucent or clear.

One of the more utilitarian roofing options, corrugated roofing is relatively tough, easy to install, and is a solid choice for any practical roofing job.

#### • EPDM

EDPM is one of the most durable roofing options available on the market. Comprised of ethylene and propylene, it is made to simulate rubber. Among modern roofing options, it lasts far longer than its competitors. EDPM is resistant to weathering, hail, low temperatures, thermal shock, ultraviolet radiation, fire and even hurricane force winds. It definitely pays for itself over time, and should be on any businesses short list when considering commercial roofing.

#### • PVC Plastic Roofing and Thermoplastic Polyolefin

PVC roofing is gaining notoriety and the industry demand for it is growing rapidly. It is beneficial because it is durable, easy to install and relatively inexpensive.

Some thermoplastic polyolefin, or TPO, membrane roofing, options have polyester reinforcement. Light reflective technology and other upgrades enhance their value and utility as well. PVC roofing is an alternative option to EPDM as it shares many of the same aspects of durability.

### A Detailed Description of the Top 5 Roofing Choices

While there are a variety of roofing options on the market, there are a few which are preferred among the rest. Today's trends lean toward natural motifs, modern dramatic lines, and high quality sustainable synthetics. When considering roofing options for your home, it is a good idea to look at the forerunners side by side and assess the pros and cons of each.

Roofing is one of the most important aspects of your home; it serves a utilitarian function before anything else. Ideally you will find materials that provide the perfect combination of aesthetics and functionality.

This e-book was written to introduce you to the most commonly used roofing materials. After reading it, you should have an idea of the strengths, weaknesses and commonalities of each choice. In this section we will be looking at the top five most utilized residential roofing materials on the market.

You may find that your first choice is no longer what you thought it would be, or that you were on the right track all along. You should also garner a better idea of what questions you may need to ask before installation begins.

#### • Composition Shingles

Composition roof shingles are the most widely used roofing choice in residential roofing. They are available in a variety of colors and are suitable for an array of roof designs. Some varieties of composition shingles can be made to resemble metal, slate, tile and wood. The cost of designer composition roofing materials, such as Architectural Fiberglass Shingles, is nominal when compared to the natural roofing materials they mimic. However, the most cost effective varieties are the plain fiberglass-based shingles with clean lines.

Composition shingles are asphalt based. Their installation is relatively easy and they require little upkeep. They are fire resistant as well. It is worth noting, in humid climates, they can become prone to mildew and moss. Some manufactures use a treatment to reduce the occurrence of organic growth. Although they do have a slight vulnerability to wind and ice, they are inexpensive and easy to repair.

With the exception of rubber or plastic composites, whenever you chose a faux roofing option, composition shingles, of some variety, are most likely the option you will encounter. They come under a variety of names and appearances. Laminate, composite, dimensional and architectural are just a few terms you may hear. The key is, if they are asphalt based, then they are most likely in the composition shingle family.

#### • Architectural Fiberglass Shingles

Architectural fiberglass shingles are a modern take on traditional fiberglass asphalt shingles. You may hear them referred to as laminated, 3D or dimensional shingles as well. The shingles are chameleonic in nature, designed to mimic a variety of natural roofing options such as tile, slate and wood.

When compared to traditional asphalt shingles, architectural shingles are three times thicker. They have a tri-layered composition of a traditional asphalt fiberglass blend, with a top layer of mineral granules covered in ceramic to provide texture and depth. They are designed to increase the appearance of shadows and lines; a dramatic three-dimensional appearance is achieved once they are installed.

Most architectural shingles are lightweight, eliminating the need for additional structural support. However, varieties with a higher wind resistance can be more substantial. Their installation difficulty is generally in par with traditional asphalt shingles, save the time to afford design decisions. Homes with Victorian style roofs, gables, steep roof planes, and turrets are all prime candidates for architectural shingles.

When picking architectural shingles, the options tend to look similar on the surface. However, seemingly small variations can mean a large difference in the strength and longevity of your roof. For example, architectural shingles can come with one, two, or three points of adhesive contact. Choosing shingles with more points of adhesion adds extra strength to your roofing system. Although you will not be able to see it once your roof is installed, the additional price for the added security is well worth it.

Advancements in architectural roofing are constantly leaping forward; each generation provides more value to homeowners than the last. For example, some varieties boast a zinc coating that can aid in combating mold or algae growth. Others provide light deflection or additional insulation. The variety you choose should be based on your homes needs and local environmental factors.

#### • Composite Slate

Synthetic slate costs about a third of natural slate. It is far more lightweight, which makes it an excellent option for homeowners who would like real slate but do not have home structures that can support the weight. It is comprised from recycled rubber, plastic or a combination of the two. Although natural slate can last a lifetime, composite slate is only guaranteed for 50 years, making it comparable to natural wood in longevity.

Faux slate is nearly indistinguishable from the real thing once installed. Real slate is thick, but brittle. On the opposite end, faux slate is difficult to damage, even when cold. It is also extremely fire resistant. Perhaps best of all is that composite slate offers a divergence from traditional asphalt shingles. A sound piece of advise, when picking composite slate, choose products that have thickness, durability and extensive warranties.

### • Standing Seam Metal Roofing

Standing seam metal roofing was once isolated to use on commercial buildings. Although homeowners liked the look, it simply was not attainable. Now the option to outfit your roof with a standing seam design is within reach. There are a host of varieties to choose from.

As far as functionality, it is actually the, visually stunning, standing seam aspect of the roofing materials that is its strongest asset. The weakest points of any roof are the areas where the materials join. It is at those points that water tends to infiltrate the roof. With standing seam roofs those areas are raised, providing another layer of protection. Another benefit to improve water resistance is that there are no horizontal seams.

While standing seam metal roofing comes with a higher cost initially, its increased durability, lessened need for upkeep, and lifespan makes it less expensive in the long run. It is worth noting, roofs with a pitch of lower than 2:12 are not suitable for standing seam roofing. Consulting with a professional contractor is key.

#### • Stone Coated Steel Metal Roofs

Stone coated steel is created by a combination of zinc and aluminum bound stone chips coated with an acrylic gel overlay. The combination provides the effect of natural stone. It was initially developed in World War II to rebuild and reinforce damaged buildings, as well as to withstand harsh climates, so by nature it is durable. It is also rust resistant, provides noise insulation, and is lightweight.

Most quality varieties are guaranteed to never split or crack. There are even models rated to withstand winds upwards of 120 miles per hour, a beneficial bonus considering Texas weather. Stone coated steel is an excellent choice for persons who wish to have a modern look that is more natural and earthy than regular steel. Another bonus is that there are more color varieties available with stone coated steel than with its plain metal counterparts.

A great deal more than appearance comes into play when you are considering a roofing option for your home. Factors such as weight limitations, environmental resistance, and your roofing style can affect what you can and should choose. It is important to consult a roofing specialist that is knowledgeable about all the roofing options available, their strengths, and limitations.

# The Questions a Homeowner Should Ask Before Hiring Any Roofing Contractor

Your home or business is a valuable asset. A great deal of time, love and money are invested in it. It is important that whenever you choose to have work done on your property, you acquire the best professionals available. Since there are no licensing laws for roofing contractors in Texas, it will take initiative on your part to weed out undesirable candidates. There are some key questions you can ask any contractor wishing to submit a bid to you. These questions are the first step to ensuring you do not end up with a roofing nightmare.

#### **Key Questions:**

#### 1. Are you registered with and in good standing with the Better Business Bureau? If so, what is your rating?

Posing this question directly to your contractor will give you a chance to let them know you will be checking their credentials.

A homeowner who will dig into their history may intimidate a faulty contractor.

After this question is answered, you would do well to check the status of the contractor's standing with the BBB yourself.

# 2. Are you a member of a recognized local or national roofing association?

Associations such as the Midwest, National or North Texas Roofing Association are designed to provide consumers with reputable entities that represent a pool of responsible professional contractors. As a person seeking roofing repair or replacement, you should utilize those sources to gain further assurance of your potential contractor's reputation.

# 3. Is your company based in Texas? If so, how many years have you been operating here? Where is your company's office?

Established professional contractors will have an office location. Often, especially after storm season, waves of out of out of state contractors show up to cash in on the destruction.

Once they have collected a few contracts they leave the state, never to be seen again. That leaves property owners in a position of having no local point of contact for any issues that may arise. Worse, in the event of a faulty job, recourse is hard to achieve.

# 4. Are you insured? If so, what type of insurance do you have, and what does it cover? May I see your certificate of insurance?

This point is perhaps one of the most important ones to be assured of. In Texas, your roofing contractor does not have to be insured. However it is a liability for you if they are not. Rather than risk any unnecessary liability, it is better to limit yourself to contractors with verifiable insurance information.

### 5. Who will be the site and project supervisor/s? May I have their name and contact info?

Having supervisor contacts is a must. This question works in a twofold manner by helping you establish how professionally your contractor's team is organized. Lack of organization can be a red flag.

### 7. Do you have credit references? May I have a list of local suppliers you utilize?

This question often surprises property owners. However, if you do not want to end up in a sticky situation where you are footing the bill for supplies twice, it is worth asking. Make sure your contractor has a history of honoring payment of supply costs.

### 9. Will you be obtaining a permit before beginning to work on my roof?

### 10. Are you certified to install any particular roofing systems?

### 11. Are you licensed?

Texas does not require roofing contractors to be licensed. If your contractor answers yes to this question, ask to view the license and then verify its validity with the issuing agency.
